

Before, During, and After Reading with Your Child...

Tips for Parents

Before Reading

Choice: Allow your child to choose which book to read.

Picture Walk: Flip through each page looking at the pictures to determine what the story is about.

Predict: Ask your child... -What characters do you think might be in the book? -Will be a problem in the story and why? -What may happen in the story based on the pictures? Prior Knowledge: Ask

your child what they already know about the topic of this book.

Vocabulary: Talk about words in the story that are unknown or important in comprehending the story.

During Reading

Character Act: Have your child act out characters' actions.

Predict: Ask your child what they think will happen next.

Discuss the text: -Who are the characters? -What's the setting?

-What's the problem and the solution?

Reread: Have your child reread a favorite line or part of the story with you. **Write:** Use sticky notes to make notes about the character, setting, and events in the story.

Vocabulary: Discuss word meanings in context using context clues.

Setting: Draw a map of the setting(s) in the book, including labels.

Make Connections: Ask your child to connect the story to something they have seen in a movie, in another book, or experienced in their own life.

After Reading

Write: Have your child draw a picture of his favorite part of the story and write about the drawing.

Be creative: Have your child retell the story in his/her own words but change the characters or how the story ends. Use props and costumes and act out a favorite part of the story. Word search: Turn to any page of the book. Ask your child to point to words that you call out to him. List it: Make a list of the words vour child could not read and review them at the end of the reading. Vocabulary: Discuss the meaning of new words discovered during the reading of the story. Have

your child use the vocabulary word in a sentence.

Book Review: Write a postcard or letter to a sibling/neighbor/friend that includes a brief overview of the text and explain your thoughts about it (why or why not you enjoy it).

Discuss it: Talk to your child about what intrigues, bothers, or confuses them about the book.
