




# Key Performance Indicators: K–2 SEAs

#### **Student Discipline (Q3)**

- At the end of Q3, there was a
   41% decrease in behavioral
   incidents for K-2 students
   compared to the baseline
   year (2018–19).
- The count of ISS/OSS incidents has decreased by 67% compared to the baseline year.









# Key Performance Indicators: K–2 SEAs

- Progressive discipline practices are utilized more frequently than in 2018–19.
- The suspension rates for K-2 students are drastically lower and more equitable for the various racial/ethnic groups compared to the baseline, but Black students still receive more suspensions compared to other groups.








# Key Performance Indicators: K–2 SEAs

#### **SEA Retention**

- Of the SEAs hired in 2021–22, 77% are still in the classroom working as SEAs.
- Fifty-four (54) SEAs have transitioned into teaching roles and 37 hold a non-teaching role with MSCS.
- For those who are in teaching roles,
  76% are teaching in a K-5 classroom.






# Key Performance Indicators: SEL Supports

For quarter 3, almost all District-managed schools had SEL supports through Behavioral Specialists, ReSet Room Assistant or both.

#### Student Discipline (Q3)

- Schools have drastically reduced their OSS suspension rates for 2021–22 compared to 2018–19.
  - Behavioral Specialists only- 30% reduction
  - Both ReSet Room Assistants & Behavioral Specialists- 22% reduction





# Key Performance Indicators: SEL Supports

- Across all grade bands and support types, schools have decreased their use of ISS & OSS actions.
- Middle & high schools continue to see higher discipline rates than K–8 and elementary schools.
